


MEET ME AT ACM

MEET THE CRAB

Crabs represent success in Chinese culture as the word for the crab's shell (甲) also means "first" or "best". The motif of crab with reeds symbolises success at the imperial examinations.

Educated men and women in China were expected to practise calligraphy, or to write beautifully.

CRAB


China, Qing dynasty (1644–1911) Jade

A Chinese scholar of the Ming or Qing dynasty would design a studio where he could study and practise calligraphy. This large white jade crab is carefully carved and detailed. It sits on leafy waterreeds holding one reed grasped in both pincers and its mouth.

Through these activities, your child/student will learn to:


- Experiment, observe, and predict
