

MEET THE FISH

According to Chinese beliefs, fish represent wealth and prosperity, as the Chinese word for "fish" (鱼) sounds similar to the word for "plenty" or "abundance" (余). Big shimmering fish such as carp were reared in decorative ponds in Chinese gardens. Fish were seen as a symbol of being wealthy, and they would be admired by people during parties.

STEM CUP

China, probably Gongxian kilns, around 830s Stoneware

The Tang Shipwreck was acquired through the generous donation of the Estate of Khoo Teck Puat.

These unusual cups have tubes attached to the side that are connected to a hole at the bottom. An animal figure, usually a fish or turtle, in the bottom of the cup hides the hole.

The tube works like a straw. There is some evidence that this might have been a nose-drinking cup.

Step Four: Cut along the lines.


Step Five: Criss-cross the shapes to make a tail and attach them using glue, tape or a stapler.
