18 August 2021, Singapore – In emerging stronger as an arts community, and to inspire and uplift society in a post pandemic world, there is a need for diverse talents to enrich our arts and heritage ecosystem. This year, 10 outstanding individuals have been awarded the National Arts Council (NAC) and National Heritage Board (NHB) Scholarships. These scholarships nurture exceptional talent who are committed to drive the development of Singapore's arts, heritage, and culture sector.

To support such talent development and long-term sustainable growth of the sector, NAC has committed over \$600,000 this year to eight scholarship recipients while two NHB Scholarship recipients will receive more than \$200,000 to further their studies.

The NAC Arts Scholarship recipients will further their studies in a wide range of disciplines, such as percussion performance, composing and art law. The pandemic has also given fresh impetus to the intersection of arts and areas such as technology, well-being and community building. Accordingly, NAC has supported applicants in arts and technology, dance therapy and community arts.

Upon completion of their studies, scholars can look forward to meaningful opportunities to develop and sustain their careers. NAC continues to partner the sector in providing opportunities for scholars to be hosted by arts and cultural institutions where they will broaden their networks and





gain exposure to skillsets beyond their immediate areas of training, in addition to receiving support through mentorship and career guidance.

At NHB, scholars play an active role in safeguarding Singapore's heritage, by celebrating our diverse cultures with local audiences, and exchanging experiences, knowledge and ideas with the international community. The NHB Scholarship recipients will explore areas such as archaeology, conservation, museum studies, curatorial studies and history.

The broader range of disciplines supported by the Arts and Heritage Scholarships over the years reflects the growth and maturity of Singapore's arts, culture and heritage ecosystem, and the deepening of capabilities across a range of specialisations. Through the scholarships, we hope to encourage talented individuals to pursue varied careers in these sectors, and develop future leaders who inspire their peers and galvanise the arts and culture landscape in Singapore.

Brief Background of Recipients

She is inspired by devising processes and collaborating with the community and artists to co-create multidisciplinary works.

As a stage actress, some of her notable works include *Exile or Pursuit* (Inarts Theatre), *The Magic Lantern* (Paper Monkey, won ST Life! Award for Best Production for Young), *11* (Theatre Practice, nominated for Best Ensemble), *Home Boxes* (Paper Monkey, nominated for Best Ensemble), and *David the Best* (Drama Box).

Renee's directorial works include *In A New Light* (Imaginate, The Art Ground), *The House of Bernada Alba* (NAFA), *Wonderland* (Double bill, M1 Peer Pleasure 2019), *The Puppet King* (NAFA, Toy Factory).

Renee founded Her Playback Theatre in 2018, a company made up of women to serve women's stories. She is also with Tapestry Playback Theatre since 2006, working with various communities to promote dialogue and social change. As one of the co-founders of Cassia Kaki 2.0, Renee worked with the elderly to provide support for the senior community.

Renee is a graduate of the Centre of Playback Theatre (Dip) and the National University of Singapore (BA). She is currently teaching as an adjunct lecturer at Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts and Singapore Polytechnic.

Sindhura is a graduate of the Theatre Studies programme at the National University of Singapore. Over the years, she has diversified her largely performance-based portfolio to include writing, facilitating, directing dramaturgy through her training and work with companies such as Teater Ekamatra, The Necessary Stage and The Finger Players (TFP). She was the first recipient of TFP's year-long fellowship programme for mid-career practitioners to deepen their understanding of puppetry. She has also been an English teacher and curriculum writer over the last eight years.

Sindhura is committed to growing a theatre scene that holds space for all communities and that makes room to present a range of authentic accounts of life in Singapore. As a core team member of Women of Shakti, Singapore's first empowerment group for Tamil-speaking foreign migrant workers and having worked with Birds Migrant Theatre, she has witnessed the arts as a means for underrepresented communities to represent themselves on their own terms.

Sindhura is keen to have her voice be part of a landscape that lets us all shape greater, more inclusive aspirations as a society and is extremely grateful to the NAC for giving her the opportunity to be one step closer to making this vision a reality.

Brief Background of Recipients

Wan Tong is pursuing Liberal Arts at Yale-NUS College and has just started the first year of her studies.

Being able to put Singapore on the world map, this sparked her interests in Singapore's built heritage, and showcasing it to the rest of the world.

She continued to pursue her interests in this area thereafter, by working on some notable projects including the gazette of the Fullerton Hotel as Singapore's 71st national monument in 2015; the gazette of the Changi Prison Wall as Singapore's 72nd national monument in 2016; and the development of the Founder's Memorial in 2019. She worked with multiple stakeholders on these projects and learnt the importance of understanding heritage from different perspectives.

Sarah will be pursuing a Masters of Arts (Cultural Studies) at SOAS University of London, where she hopes to gain exposure into the different cultures and ways of thinking. This would help her cultivate a better understanding on the perspectives that need to be considered when working on future projects. Ultimately, she hopes to deepen her understanding of Singapore's local context, and inspire others to find out more about the intangible aspects of Singapore's built heritage.
