REMEMBERING THE WAR THROUGH *BATTLE FOR SINGAPORE*

The National Heritage Board commemorates the 79th anniversary of the Fall of Singapore with new programmes and special access tours to historic World War II sites

Singapore, 15 February 2021 – The Fall of Singapore in 1942 was a significant chapter in our nation’s history. Despite the many decades that have passed, the tales of tenacity and resilience displayed by our nation’s war heroes during that tumultuous period remain important and relatable today.

2 From 20 February to 14 March 2021, members of the public can revisit our nation’s wartime history and stories through the National Heritage Board’s (NHB) *Battle for Singapore* programme, which features a series of specially curated tours and programmes offered in partnership with NHB’s Museum Roundtable (MR) members, citizen historians and heritage enthusiasts.

3 Participants will be able to embark on tours to World War II (WWII) sites such as the Former Ford Factory and Bukit Brown, as well as tune in online to talks conducted in collaboration with community groups and researchers. As 2021 also marks the 25th anniversary of the MR, this year’s *Battle for Singapore* will feature programmes organised in close partnership with MR institutions. They include the *Fort Siloso Rediscovery Tour*, organised in partnership with Fort Siloso, which is managed by Sentosa Development Corporation, that will grant participants special access to historical sites in Fort Siloso that are exclusively opened for tour participants.

4 Mr Gerald Wee, Director of International & Museum Relations, NHB, said: “Through *Battle for Singapore 2021*, we hope that Singaporeans can rediscover the history not only behind familiar landmarks and sites around Singapore, but also unearth diverse and lesser-known stories related to our nation’s WWII past. More importantly, in revisiting Singapore’s

war experience and the stories of resilience of our forefathers who lived through those times, we hope that participants will be inspired by the themes of solidarity and strength that are built through adversity, even as we continue to navigate these challenging times.”

Battle for Singapore 2021 Programmes

5 The diverse programme line-up will consist of a total of more than 40 tour runs and programme sessions offered by NHB and its partners. Some of the highlights of this year’s *Battle for Singapore* include:

Fort Siloso Rediscovery Tour (NEW)

In the Fort Siloso Rediscovery Tour, organised in partnership with Sentosa Development Corporation, participants will explore the grounds of Fort Siloso with history experts who will take them on a journey to learn more about the role of the fort in Singapore’s maritime past. The highlight of this special access tour will be visits to exclusive areas, including the Siloso Pier, coastal mine defense casement, and the Coastal Search Light stations. These areas tell a more complex history of Fort Siloso and will show that a familiar place like Fort Siloso still has many other stories to tell.

Mini Tour: Former Ford Factory - Singapore Discovery Centre (NEW)

A two-stop guided tour that visits two MR members – Former Ford Factory and Singapore Discovery Centre. At the Former Ford Factory, participants can learn more about the Japanese Occupation through archival records and artefacts on display, and also use an interactive mobile app to enhance their experiences. Participants will then visit the newly-revamped galleries at the Singapore Discovery Centre, which provide insights into life during the Occupation through enhanced technology such as AR, as well as stories of resilience and courage during the war.

Mini Tour: Eurasian Heritage Gallery - National Gallery Singapore (NEW)

A two-stop guided tour that visits two MR members – Eurasian Heritage Gallery and National Gallery Singapore. At the Eurasian Heritage Gallery, participants will discover how the

Eurasian community suffered during WWII under the Japanese Occupation and how several Eurasian war heroes emerged from the trials and tribulations. At National Gallery Singapore, participants will journey across specific sites around the Gallery's City Hall Wing such as the City Hall Steps and City Hall Chamber to explore different perspectives of how WWII was experienced in Singapore.

Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital Heritage Gallery Tour (NEW)

Learn about WWII through the lens of Kwong Wai Shiu Free Hospital, a charitable healthcare facility founded by a group of Cantonese businessmen in 1910. During the Japanese Occupation, part of the hospital compound was destroyed by bombs. Despite the destruction, the hospital continued with its mission of serving the needy, expanded its services to admit children and infants, and even buried war victims. Uncover more about the hospital's WWII history through a guided tour of the gallery and an informative sharing session by Mr Lee Kok Leong, curator of the Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital Heritage Gallery.

WWII Changi Point Walking Tour (NEW)

Known for its laid-back charm, Changi Point has become a destination for leisure and recreation. Many of its present-day leisure and recreational facilities tell a deeper story; one that very much has to do with a military past and the events that led up to the Fall of Singapore and its aftermath.

Join Jerome Lim of *The Long and Winding Road* on a walk around Changi Point and its boardwalk to uncover its history through its sports and recreational facilities, geographical features, facilities and some surprising remnants of the past, and to examine the roles that some of them may have played during the Second World War.

Webinar: The Comfort Women of Singapore in History and Memory by Assoc. Prof. Kevin Blackburn

Why have the voices of Singapore women who worked in the sex industry of the Japanese military in Singapore during the Second World War been missing from history? Were there Singapore women working as comfort women? This talk uncovers the missing voices of the

comfort women of Japanese-occupied Singapore during the Second World War and explains why Singapore comfort women have not come forward with their testimonies as comfort women in other societies in Asia have done since the 1990s.

Guided Tours, Programmes and Public Talks**Fort Siloso Rediscovery Tour**

Date: 20, 21, 27, 28 February, and 6, 7, 13, 14 March 2021

Time: 10am – 12pm, 2pm – 4pm

Fort Siloso played a huge role in the defence of Singapore since the 1870s when it was built. During the Second World War, the fort was armed with a variety of guns and deployed submarine mines that deterred invasion by sea. The fort survived the war and in 1975 restoration of the fort started on its extensive tunnel complexes and gun emplacements. Today, Fort Siloso is Singapore's only preserved coastal fort featuring one of the largest collections of real coastal artillery guns in Asia.

In the Fort Siloso Rediscovery Tour, participants will explore the grounds of Fort Siloso with history experts who will take them on a journey to learn more about the role of the fort in Singapore's maritime past. The highlight of the tour will be visits to areas that are exclusively opened for tour participants. These include the Siloso Pier, coastal mine defence casement, and the Coastal Search Light stations. These areas tell a more complex history of Fort Siloso and will show that a familiar place like Fort Siloso still has many stories to tell.

This tour is led by Dr. John Kwok and Saifullah Kamaludin, and is offered in partnership with Sentosa Development Corporation, in commemoration of the 25th Anniversary of the Museum Roundtable.

About the guides

Dr. John Kwok is a professional historian and has been part of the *Battle for Singapore* programme since 2014. His research has helped to uncover the history of many war heritage sites in Singapore like Marsiling Tunnels, Attap Valley Bunker, and View Road Building.

Saifullah Kamaludin is a history enthusiast who has been with Sentosa Development Corporation (SDC) since 2007. He currently co-leads the Culture and Heritage initiatives under the Sustainable Sentosa programme. Over the years, he has channeled his passion into his profession, contributing to the repository of knowledge on Sentosa's rich heritage and bringing fresh perspectives and insights to the Sentosa story. Aside from managing the operations of Fort Siloso, Saifullah has also developed and conducted a wide range of tours and outreach programmes for SDC, harmonising the education and conservation efforts within Sentosa in the process.

Mini Tour: Former Ford Factory – Singapore Discovery Centre

Stop 1: Former Ford Factory

15 February marks the anniversary of the surrender of the British to the Japanese in 1942. The boardroom of Ford Factory was where Britain's Lieutenant-General A.E. Percival met Lieutenant-General Yamashita and surrendered unconditionally to the Japanese, setting the stage for the Japanese Occupation of Singapore. The Former Ford Factory was subsequently restored by the National Archives of Singapore in 2006 and currently houses the permanent World War II exhibition, Surviving the Japanese Occupation: War and its Legacies.

Join us for a special guided tour of Former Ford Factory in February to learn about the fall of Singapore and the Japanese Occupation. Discover wartime stories through archival records, published materials, oral history accounts. You will also get to see selected artefacts that are not on display in the gallery.

Stop 2: Singapore Discovery Centre

At the Singapore Discovery Centre, participants will be brought on an immersive journey where they will learn about the Japanese Occupation and the Fall of Singapore in the newly revamped exhibition galleries. Using enhanced technology such as Augmented Reality (AR) and heartwarming stories of our people's courage, their resistance and resilience, participants will be reminded of the importance of Singapore's commitment to defence even during peace time. Participants will also be given an exclusive tour to SAF Training Institute (SAFTI) which offers a unique glimpse into the life of an officer cadet and the role of Singapore Armed Forces (SAF) in the defence and security of Singapore.

Mini Tour: Eurasian Heritage Gallery – National Gallery Singapore

Stop 1: Eurasian Heritage Gallery

At the Eurasian Heritage Gallery, tour participants will discover how the Eurasian community, suffered along with other ethnic groups in Singapore during WWII under the Japanese Occupation, and how several war heroes emerged from the trials and tribulations.

Stop 2: Monuments & Memorials: Walking tours of City Hall at National Gallery Singapore

City Hall, formerly known as Municipal Building, has had a rich and colourful history since its completion in 1929. The building has borne witness to defining moments in Singapore

history—from serving as a bomb shelter during the Japanese Occupation to housing Singapore’s post-independence government and ministry offices. Today, it forms a wing of National Gallery Singapore. In these building and art tours, guest historian Tan Teng Teng will lead you on a journey through history, making stops at storied locations such as the City Hall Steps and City Hall Chamber. You will also hear reflections on the making of *City Hall: If Walls Could Talk*, an exhibition by the Gallery on lesser-known stories that occurred within this national monument. The tour will conclude at the exhibition *Siapa Nama Kamu: Art in Singapore since the 19th Century*, where selected artworks will be highlighted to contextualise stories and memories of war through the eyes of our artists.

Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital Heritage Gallery Tour

Learn about the Second World War through the lens of Kwong Wai Shiu Free Hospital, a charitable healthcare facility founded by a group of Cantonese businessmen in 1910. During the occupation, part of the hospital compound was destroyed by bombs. Despite the destruction, the hospital continued with its mission of serving the needy, expanded its services to admit children and infants, and even buried war victims.

Traditionally supported by the Chinese community, the war also led to the reversal of fortunes for some of the hospital’s key patrons such as Ching Kee Sun and Boey Khye Hong. Before the Occupation, they had fervently supported China in its war efforts against the Japanese through participation in Cantonese associations and fund-raising efforts. What happened to these individuals when Singapore became Syonan-To?

Uncover more stories through a tour of the gallery which includes a classroom session where newspaper articles of the period will be shared. Conducted in Mandarin, this tour is led by Mr Lee Kok Leong, curator of the Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital Heritage Gallery. Limited slots are available, on first-come-first-served basis, so sign up now!

Battle of Bukit Brown / Mount Pleasant

The tour follows the course of the battles on 14-15 February 1942 as the Japanese 5th Division attempted to capture the MacRitchie Reservoir area and attack south through Bukit Brown and Mount Pleasant, which were defended by the British 18th Division.

Bukit Brown (Hills 3 and 4)

Join Peter Pak of All Things Bukit Brown as he takes you on an exploration of Bukit Brown and hear stories of tragedy (the sinking of a ship that led to the deaths of many women and children) and of betrayal (leading to the death of the King's Medal recipient whose ashes were only returned 11 years later and given a hero's burial). Peter will also reveal the stories of an ambush by the resistance forces that led to the death of a pioneer whose burial was touted by the Japanese Military Administration as Syonan-to's first public funeral, and of another survivor of that very same ambush whose life was transformed by that event and who went on after the war to play a pivotal role in the growth of Buddhism in Singapore.

Finally, we will hear stories of Chinese leaders who were forced to collaborate with the Japanese under duress, or who did so to survive or reap personal gain. Hear the stories of how they survived or died during this difficult period in Singapore's history at Bukit Brown.

On the study of war and commemoration, he has co-authored with Karl Hack, *Did Singapore Have to Fall?* (Routledge, 2004) and *War Memory and the Making of Modern Malaysia and Singapore* (NUS Press, 2012), as well as co-edited with him *Forgotten Captives in Japanese Occupied Asia* (Routledge, 2008).

Adventures in Architecture Tour @ National Gallery Singapore

The National Gallery Singapore is a building and space anchored by time and history. Its architecture has many grand and recognisable features. What are the shapes that make the Corinthian Columns in the City Hall Chamber?
