


The COVID-19 pandemic has changed our lives and what it means to be Better Together. We dedicate Children's Season this year to the values that help us

Around 1750, ceramics in animal shapes became popular. Skillful painting made these animal ceramics look real.









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## Let's Play Together Sometimes, it's not about winning

What matters more to you – to win, to play your favourite game, or to play with people you like?






This is one of the oldest games invented in South Asia. It's called Pachisi, and is often referred to as the national game of India. It was played by nearly everyone.

Have you played this game before? It can be played by two to four players. The pieces start from the centre, move down the middle of the "arm", and then around the outside of the board in an anti-clockwise direction before returning to the centre. The first player to get all his or her pieces back to the centre wins.

The penbox with inkwell was used to store the pen and ink for writing. It is on display near this table in the gallery.







# Be My Guest

Have you ever invited friends to your house? Do you miss having them over? What would you do to make your friends feel welcome?



It was a traditional custom in many Southeast Asian countries to serve betel to guests as a welcome.

This betel box was made in Myanmar. Inside are five containers and a tray to present ingredients for betel chewing. The decoration on the outside includes the 12 symbols of the Burmese zodiac, which is similar to the Western zodiac.

#### FUN FACT

"Betel" refers to betel leaves, which can be rolled up with other ingredients to be chewed.



This porcelain dish is decorated with birds and the popular motif of the Three Friends of Winter (suihan sanyou 岁寒三友).

The Three Friends are the evergreen pine, bamboo, and the plum tree, which blossoms in winter despite the very cold temperatures.







### Small, but oh so strong




