The blue of blue-and-white porcelain is made from cobalt, a scarce mineral that the Chinese imported from Persia (Iran today) until they found their own source at home. Blue-and-white porcelain became so popular that it was one of China's most famous exports to the wider world.







Fold to make crease. Unfold




Fold forward along dotted lines

Step-fold forward as shown






Fold in along dotted lines


The flowers and creatures on the paper charms below are common auspicious symbols seen in Chinese art.
