This wedding outfit for a Peranakan Chinese bride from our museum inspired Guo Pei to make her own version for the modern Chinese bride.

"Couture" (pronounced "kuh-toor") is a term from French, meaning design and creation of one-of-a-kind clothing for customers.

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The blue of blue-and-white porcelain is made from cobalt, a scarce mineral that the Chinese imported from Persia (Iran today) until they found their own source at home. Blue-and-white porcelain became so popular that it was one of China's most famous exports to the wider world.

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
The flowers and creatures on the paper charms below are common auspicious symbols seen in Chinese art.

- 4. Tie the ends to create your wristlet (short string) or necklace (longer string)!






