Fright Night Descends On The Asian Civilisations Museum

[24 October 2008, SINGAPORE] The Asian Civilisations Museum welcomes visitors to the dark side as it celebrates Halloween for the first time. Together with the Singapore Paranormal Investigators (SPI), the museum is presenting *Fright Night!*, from 8pm to midnight on 31 October 2008 (Friday). Admission to the museum and all event activities is free.

Museum galleries will be open till midnight for a gallery tour with a difference. SPI volunteers dressed in their spooky best will prowl the galleries to give visitors a thrilling spin on artefacts such as the towering Black and White Faces of Impermanence, underworld guardians from Chinese popular religion. Visitors can expect to learn about the tragic deaths of the two friends, commonly identified by their terrifying expressions and long tongues. Other artefacts include a carved human skull from the Dayak community from Borneo and ancestral carvings from Nias Island in Indonesia, which are said to contain the last breaths of the dead!

Visitors with an interest in the supernatural will also have a chance to take a sneak peek into the case files of the Singapore Paranormal Investigators as they present a talk and slideshow of real-life case studies from 9pm to 10pm.

Prizes will be awarded to visitors who come in the best Halloween costumes, and free ice-cream and candy will be available, while stocks last.
