


For educators and parents with children ages 4 & up

Learning about Atuk (Grandpa)

An artefact hunt based on the Shapes Early Learning Resources (ELR) booklet



Hello parents and educators,

In this hunt, explore the museum with your children to find 5 artefacts that are featured in the Shapes Early Learning Resources (ELR) booklet.

Use the clues to look for the artefacts and spend some time talking and learning more about them as you go along. Have fun!

This activity is estimated to take up to 1 hour with discussion questions included.



Tips to maximise the hunt activity experience

• Print out this booklet and bring it along with you to the galleries or download it to your mobile device for easy reference during the hunt.

• Read out the story and questions on the following pages to engage children in conversations.

• Encourage children to take charge of searching for the answers in the ELR booklet using the clues provided in the hunt.

• If feasible, bring cameras for children to take photos of the artefacts (without flash), so that they can be used for reflection time at home or a show-and-tell activity in school after the hunt.

• Encourage children to reflect on their experience with some question prompts below:

- a. When did you go to the museum?
- b. What was your favourite artefact at the museum?
- c. Why do you like this artefact?
- d. What did you learn about this artefact?
- e. Who would you like to visit the museum with?

• Encourage children to look for objects at home or in school that are similar or related to the artefacts and to share their similarities and differences.

Artefact Hunt: Learning about Atuk (Grandpa)

Dennis wakes up one morning and finds Papa Sunbear flipping through an old photo album. One of the photos shows someone who looks very much like Papa Sunbear, holding something **circular**, black and green!


"Who is this in this picture and what is he holding?" Dennis asks.

Papa Sunbear replies, "This is your Atuk (Grandpa)! Atuk was a policeman, and he was holding a..."

What do you think Atuk was holding?

Hint

Look at the word in bold! Which artefact in the Shapes ELR booklet fits the description? Once you have the answer, let us look for the artefact in the Singapore History Gallery on level 1!





Papa Sunbear turns the page, and the next photo is of Atuk and his friend. "This is Uncle Ong who lived in a house that was once a coolie house," Papa Sunbear says. Dennis scratches his head and asks, "What is a coolie house?"

Papa Sun Bear explains: "Back then, many men who came to Singapore from China would work as coolies, or labourers. They would stay at coolie houses.

Can you spot an **octagonal** object that tells you more about the coolie house?"

Look at the word in bold! Which artefact in the Shapes ELR booklet fits the description?



"Coolies had to do a lot of physical manual work, such as construction, and often carried heavy items as part of their job."



Take a close look at this artefact in front of you.

- Can you spot any numbers on it?
- What do you think life was like as a coolie, and living in a coolie house?

The next photo shows Atuk standing in front of a shophouse. Papa Sunbear explains that this is a Chettiar's *kittangi*, or "warehouse" in Tamil.

The Chettiars are a group of people who came from South India, and they primarily worked as moneylenders in Singapore.

Atuk's father needed to borrow money from the Chettiar when Atuk was born, as there was one more mouth in the family to feed.

There is an interesting shape in this photo. It is a foursided shape with two parallel sides and two non-parallel sides. What is this **trapezium**-shaped object in the Chettiar's house?

Look at the word in bold! Which artefact in the Shapes ELR booklet fits the description?



By the 1980s, Atuk had saved enough to buy a brand new HDB flat! The next photo shows him sitting in the kitchen contentedly having his breakfast.

"Did you know that Atuk's favourite drink was Horlicks?" Papa Sunbear smiles fondly. "He would drink from his favourite **square** brown..."

• What is the favourite drink of your family members?




