#### What is this kit about?

Developed together with Wigglepods Pte Ltd, this kit contains five activities based on the Colours Early Learning Resource booklet , for parents to:

- Help your child relate to, better understand, and talk about local artefacts in the museum's collection, while learning more about colours
- Carry out guided music and movement activities with your child at home, and be inspired to come up with more activity ideas
- Have lots of fun with your child!

Children will get to practise language and numeracy skills such as print awareness, spelling, singing and patterning. With many of the activities incorporating elements of music and movement, children can also hone their motor skills, body awareness, concentration and creativity.

#### How do I use this kit?

For each activity, a recommended age group is stated and key early learning concepts such as "rhythmic beat" are explained. You may choose to go through selected activities or all of them.

The activities include

- Templates or worksheets that can be printed out and worked on together
- Video and audio clips that the whole family can sing and dance along to!

We recommend that you go through this kit while connected to reliable Wi-Fi at home. Have fun!

- Cognitive skills: Eye-hand coordination, focusing, visual perception, problem solving


#### A Note for Parents





- Promote spatial-temporal reasoning
- Develop the ability to form generalisations



- Cognitive skills: Working memory, problem solving, eye-hand coordination

- Language skills: Listening, vocabulary

- Develop spatial awareness
- Engage sensory and motor systems
- Support language development

## Colours Everywhere


Rhythmic beat for young children refers to the syllables in the words.

## How to play:

- Follow the dotted lines to cut out the artefact cards on pages 15 to 18.
- 2. Play the song ♠) Colours Everywhere.
- 3. Listen to the rhythmic pattern of the artefact names featured in the song.
- 4. Lay out the artefact cards according to the pattern in the song.

Extension: You can create your own pattern by rearranging the artefact cards, or look into and try singing the song using other colours and artefacts!
