This conversation kit is for you and your family members, including grandparents and extended family who may not live together with you. It is designed to help you:










What is this kit about?


Before you begin:

1. Take some time to go through this kit.



- 2. Discuss with your family members and decide:
 - a) Who will be the planner and main story collector?
 - b) Who will take part in this conversation?
 - c) How do you plan to conduct this conversation?
 - Face to face, or over a phone/video call?





- d) Where and when will you have this conversation?
 - Choose a time of the day when everyone can set aside 1 to 2 hours to participate in this activity.
 - Find a comfortable spot in the house to sit, and prepare your favourite drinks or snacks – make this experience something to look forward to!

For family members living in another household, print the cards out and send them a surprise snail mail package!

One Step Further:

Plan to collect your family stories, by taking notes or making a voice recording (Zoom has a recording function for this)!

Let's begin!

During your conversation:

- 1. Turn to the Menu on page 9.
- 2. The oldest person in the group closes their eyes and points to a topic!
- 3. Click on the chosen topic, and a conversation card will appear. The top right corner of the card will tell you who should answer the questions.
- 4. Each topic includes a few cards. Make sure that everyone has a chance to share!
- 5. When you're done with all the cards, click to return to the Menu. If you're having fun, why not pick another topic?


















