We brought heritage to Singaporeans when physical museum visits and on-location programmes were not possible, and the digital resources produced have accelerated and enriched the growing collection of heritage content. Nonetheless, I was very encouraged to see visitors steadily return to our museums once they were able to safely reopen, with many participating actively in our other heritage offerings, both physical and digital. Chief Executive's Message

In my message last year, I likened the start of 2020 to a roller coaster ride. This analogy has continued to ring true through the rest of the year and early 2021, with the world's and Singapore's battle against the COVID-19 pandemic still very much in progress.

The closure of our museums and suspension of on-site offerings for two months during the Circuit Breaker last year was unprecedented for NHB. Thankfully, there was a silver lining, as we were compelled to accelerate the development of our digital capabilities, and in the process, learned invaluable lessons about how to make our rich library of heritage content and resources accessible and engaging even whilst navigating the most challenging circumstances.

Digital initiatives were significantly pushed to the forefront in FY2020. Highlights from this period included *DigiMuse: Circuit Breaker Edition*, the #SGCultureAnywhere and National Day campaigns, our first–ever digital Singapore HeritageFest, and many more online and hybrid offerings from our museums, divisions, and heritage institutions which sought to inspire and rally Singaporeans even as they grappled with the impact of the pandemic.

During this challenging yet exciting year, we continued to make steady progress across the four pillars of *Our SG Heritage Plan – Our Places, Our Cultures, Our Treasures,* and *Our Communities*.

It was quite a year for *Our Cultures*, as we announced the six inaugural recipients of *The Stewards of Singapore's Intangible Cultural Heritage Award*. Of course, the high point was the inscription of Hawker Culture in Singapore on the UNESCO Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity in December. It was indeed a triumphant way to close 2020, and I would like to again thank the National Environment Agency, The Federation of Merchants' Associations, Singapore, and Singaporeans from all walks of life who showed their support for the bid, for being with us on this very fruitful two-year journey.

Our Treasures saw several important milestones reached. The Heritage Conservation Centre celebrated its 20th anniversary, while the Indian Heritage Centre, Malay Heritage Centre, and Sun Yat Sen Nanyang Memorial Hall (SYSNMH) brought much-needed cheer and encouragement through online and hybrid celebrations of their respective communities' festivals, and special exhibitions. SYSNMH also saw the launch of its refreshed Gallery 3, which focuses on the social reforms, commemorative events, and identity of the Chinese community after the 1911 Revolution.

COVID-19 also presented us with the opportunity to kick-start the National Museum of Singapore's Collecting Contemporary Singapore project, which aims to chronicle significant moments in Singapore's recent and contemporary history through the collection of objects and stories that capture people's lived experiences. The project has received about 4,000 public submissions to date, ranging from photos and narrative accounts, to items such as posters and designer masks. While the collection has focused on Singaporeans' experiences of COVID-19 so far, it will be expanded to other themes over the next few years.

The unveiling of the Asian Civilisations Museum's new third-floor galleries was another significant milestone, marking the completion of the museum's multi-year refresh as Singapore's museum of Asian antiquities and decorative art. Regular revamps of our museums and institutions are important to ensure their relevance and appeal to Singaporeans, which in turn contributes to the growth of a museum-going culture in Singapore.

Our Places played their part to inspire Singaporeans.

10 National Monuments were lit up in red and white as a display of solidarity during the National Day celebrations, and a moving video in which owners and occupiers of 16 National Monuments expressed their hopes for Singapore touched many. Technology was also harnessed in a year where physically visiting many places was not possible at times. The Telok Ayer 360 project brought the National Monuments and communities in

the area onto smartphone and computer screens, and *Monumental Robo-Tours* allowed students to explore National Monuments from their classrooms.

At a time when we expanded our definition of community and gained a deeper understanding of its importance, our efforts to partner with and celebrate Our Communities went on unabated. We worked closely with former and current residents to launch the Hougang Heritage Trail, which told the story of one of Singapore's oldest heartland towns. We also continued to reach out to the more vulnerable among us. Our Heritage Cares programme worked closely with Youth Corps Singapore to adapt heritage-related content to virtual school holiday programmes for children, and under Silver Hubs, we launched the My House of Memories app, in collaboration with National Museums Liverpool and the British Council Singapore, which uses heritage content to help those living with dementia.

Our SG Heritage Plan was conceived as a five-year road map for Singapore's heritage, and we will soon enter its final year in 2022. It has given a greater focus and organisation to our work, and I am proud of what it has achieved so far. It is important that we build on the foundation it has given us, and work has already begun on Heritage Plan 2.0. Many of you reading this would in fact be part of that process, and I am looking forward to our journey together on this next lap of promoting and safeguarding our heritage.

2021 has seen the return of some normalcy, but there is still a long way to go, and very likely more twists and turns can be expected. Team NHB has been nimble and adaptable, showing fortitude and dedication in difficult times and I am very grateful to all my colleagues. To our board members, partners, volunteers, and docents, my heartfelt thanks for weathering this storm with us too. I am confident that we will emerge stronger and more united than before.

A 'Culture Boost' In Challenging Times

Our heritage and culture define us, and in times like these, can be a powerful source of inspiration and an anchor for our identity.

In FY2020, as it became necessary to limit in-person activities in our fight against COVID-19, we stepped up our digital efforts to ensure that our heritage offerings remained accessible to everyone. Our annual signature *Singapore HeritageFest* moved online for the first time in its history, as did other campaigns and festivals which celebrated our diverse cultures and aspects of intangible cultural heritage. The exploration of our tangible heritage was also extended into the virtual sphere, with our built heritage being presented in a new light through digital exhibitions and initiatives.

Throughout the year, we also worked closely with the community to co-create heritage content, strengthen existing partnerships, and forge new ones. Some of these collaborations came through projects supported by the Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth's \$75 million *Arts and Culture Resilience Package*, which assisted arts and culture organisations and practitioners hard hit by the onset of the pandemic.

These efforts ensured that Singaporeans had a seamless stream of heritage offerings and experiences to draw strength and inspiration from, even whilst dealing with an unprecedented situation and uncertain times.



CO-CREATING HERITAGE EXPERIENCES WITH THE COMMUNITY

SINGAPORE HERITAGEFEST 2020: DIGITAL EDITION

17th edition of the annual festival, and its first-ever digital edition \gg 19 June to 5 July 2020

- Reached over one million audiences digitally*.
- Involved 60 partners who co-presented a wide variety of online programmes, including videos, podcasts, as well as interactive microsites that told the lesser-known stories of Tanjong Pagar, Pasir Ris, and Kallang, live-streamed food demonstrations of beloved heritage dishes, self-guided online trails of historical precincts, photo-essays, and live dialogues.

DIGIMUSE


Launched in 2017 with the aim of engaging the wider technology sector to crowdsource ideas that enhance museum experiences and contribute to a vibrant cultural sector


- DigiMuse: Circuit Breaker Edition invited local creatives to pitch and produce bite-sized heritage-related digital content, which culminated in projects ranging from augmented reality (AR) filters to role-playing games.
- The month-long open call in May attracted a strong response of more than 70 proposals, out of which about 25 were selected to each receive up to S\$5,000 to bring their creative proposals to life.
- DigiMuse extended its reach beyond Singapore, working with Australia-based online platform Plattar to produce Plattar AR, an AR-enhanced architecture tour of the National Museum of Singapore, and also went beyond museum walls, with a SmartGuide project by Czech mobile app firm SmartGuide, that brought visitors on an audio tour of three local precincts with an AR-enhanced map.

CO-CREATING HERITAGE EXPERIENCES WITH THE COMMUNITY

NATIONAL DAY CELEBRATIONS 2020

Across NHB's museums and heritage institutions

Highlights included:

- The light-up of 10 National Monuments and arts and cultural institutions across the Bras Basah.Bugis Precinct and Civic District, including the National Museum and Asian Civilisations Museum (ACM), in the national colours of red and white.
- A moving video in which the owners and occupiers of 16 National Monuments shared stories of these treasured buildings and offered their well-wishes to Singapore.
- A series of digital trading cards that featured local pioneers such as Zubir Said, Tan Kah Kee, and S Rajaratnam, who made significant contributions to their communities and to Singapore's nation-building efforts.

SINGAPORE TALES

- A digital retelling of Singapore's myths and legends, which are an important part of our intangible cultural heritage.
- Featured two well-known legends The Attack of the Swordfish and Badang the Magnificent narrated by local artiste Benjamin Kheng and local actor Chua En Lai respectively. Singaporeans were invited to participate by contributing videos of themselves acting out scenes in the stories. Selected contributions were stitched into the final Singapore Tales videos.




















RAMADAN TOGETHER

» 23 April to 23 May 2020

- Ramadan Together sought to provide a better understanding of the social practices, customs, and beliefs of the month of Ramadan as it is observed in Singapore, as well as to enable the community to connect virtually during the Circuit Breaker period when Ramadan took place.
- A highlight was a mass *iftar* on Zoom, which was live streamed on Facebook. Participants were invited to break fast together and discuss the significance of Ramadan and Hari Raya. More than 1,200 viewers tuned in to the live stream, while the Zoom session involved 50 participants, including 20 non-Muslims.

» February 2021

- Highlights included videos featuring chefs and servers involved in the practice, a fun guide to the auspicious phrases associated with *lo hei*, and contributions from the community on social media about why and how they celebrate *lo hei*.









Hybrid celebrations by IHC


- » 14 October to 14 November 2020
- Once Upon a Deepavali Our Shared Stories explored the unique ways that Deepavali is observed in Singapore through stories from the community. Highlights included a video series that brought viewers into the homes of Indian families as they celebrated Deepavali, and a specially commissioned music video with an original song composed by local musician Shabir.
- On-site activities included a highly popular, fully subscribed Trishaw Trail, which gave participants the opportunity to revel in the atmosphere of the Little India precinct in the lead up to the Festival of Lights.













PONGAL DAY OUT 2021

Hybrid celebrations by IHC >> 9 to 17 January 2021

- Gardening workshops, farm tours, guided tours of Campbell Lane, immersive installations at IHC, and online activities, including a TikTok Pongal dance challenge, were rolled out to celebrate Pongal, and grow public awareness and understanding of this important harvest festival.
- IHC developed its first-ever Pongal microsite targeted at students and teachers, to facilitate the sharing of the festival's significance and traditions in a classroom setting.

• Featured a diverse line-up of online programmes that showcased the food, fashion, culture, and performing arts of the Malay/Muslim community.


Hybrid celebrations by SYSNMH » 14 September to 11 October 2020




Digital edition of the annual SYSNMH CultureFest >> 14 to 29 November 2020

AN OLD NEW WORLD: DIGITAL EDITION

» Launched in April 2020

- A 360° digital exhibition that brings visitors on a journey through the National Museum's bicentennial exhibition *An Old New World:* From the East Indies to the Founding of Singapore, 1600s – 1819.
- Visitors may choose to explore the galleries at their own pace, or embark on a specially curated exploration of featured artefacts and the surrounding showcases while listening to narrations by curators Daniel Tham and Iskander Mydin.
- An educator's commentary for lower secondary students, which will enable students to delve deeper into pre-colonial Singapore as they conduct their historical investigations of that period, was also launched in October 2020.




EVERY BODY PLAYS A PART

Alongside our digital push, NHB's museums and divisions continued to launch new exhibitions, galleries, outreach initiatives, and programmes, enabling Singaporeans of all ages, from all walks of life, to deepen their love and appreciation of our heritage.

At NHB, we believe that Singapore's heritage belongs to every Singaporean. The relationships that we have developed over the years with fellow professionals, enthusiasts, educators, volunteers, patrons, and Singaporeans themselves are crucial, as we strive to safeguard and promote Singapore's heritage, hand-in-hand with the community, at a time when heritage and unity are most needed.





INSCRIPTION OF HAWKER CULTURE IN SINGAPORE ON THE UNESCO REPRESENTATIVE LIST OF THE INTANGIBLE CULTURAL HERITAGE OF HUMANITY

» December 2020

- Hawker Culture in Singapore is our first Intangible Cultural Heritage (ICH) element to be inscribed on the UNESCO Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity.
- The milestone was the culmination of a two-year long collaborative journey between NHB, the National Environment Agency, The Federation of Merchants' Associations, Singapore, and Singaporeans from all walks of life who supported the bid.

The first webinar was held in January 2021.

THE STEWARDS OF SINGAPORE'S INTANGIBLE **CULTURAL HERITAGE AWARD**


- Six individuals/groups were announced as inaugural recipients of The Stewards of Singapore's Intangible Cultural Heritage Award by NHB in 2020, in recognition of their outstanding commitment to the promotion and transmission of their ICH practices to the wider community and to future generations.
- The recipients of the award were: Apsaras Arts, Mr Gwee Thian Lye (prominent wayang Peranakan and dondang sayang performer, playwright, and director), Mr Michael Ker (third generation popiah-maker at Kway Guan Huat Joo Chiat Popiah), Nam Hwa Opera, Sri Warisan Som Said Performing Arts, and Thow Kwang Pottery Jungle.
- An award ceremony was held in December 2020 to formally recognise the six recipients.



MUSE SG ICH EDITION

- NHB partnered students from the National University of Singapore's History Society and Nanyang Technological University to produce a two-part series on MUSE SG, NHB's outreach magazine, that focused solely on Singapore's ICH.
- Part of NHB's youth engagement efforts to promote interest in different aspects of Singapore's heritage.
- The partnership involved students conducting research and co-creating content on 14 ICH practices in Singapore, such as ayurveda, Eurasian cuisine, soya sauce making, and dondang sayang.

- Over 500 entries were received, highlighting the rich ICH that can be found in Singapore.

"The Nine Emperor Gods festival is one of the most important religious events for the Taoist community in South East Asia, and widely celebrated in Singapore in more than 15 temples each year. This photo depicts the final night of the Nine Emperor Gods Festival where there is an elaborate ritual to send off the gods.

Boats would be set ablaze in the sea bidding goodbye to the nine emperor gods. However, the festival, which is a celebration that dates back 2,000 years, is more than ancient cosmology and rituals, but a reflection of how our temple communities have transformed to align with our changing landscape, and a symbol of Chinese culture and tradition. Its promotion and preservation will go a long way in continuing to shape our Singaporean identity, and is an indelible part of our living cultural heritage, giving us a unique sense of identity, community and responsibility."

NEW ELEMENTS LISTED ON THE ICH INVENTORY

» November 2020

- NHB's ICH inventory exists to recognise and document Singapore's rich cultural, ethnic, and religious diversity.
- Nine elements were added to the ICH Inventory, with input from the community, bringing the total number of elements on the inventory to 97.
- The nine new elements were *kway chap*, the making and repairing of Malay drums, the making of Chinese signboards, the making of flower garlands, the making of *tempeh* and *tapai*, the Nineteen Day Feast and Bahá'í community life, the Passover and associated Jewish practices and rituals, *yusheng* and *lo hei*, and *zapin*.

URANG BANJAR: HERITAGE AND CULTURE OF THE BANJAR IN SINGAPORE

- » Malay Heritage Centre
- » 28 November 2020 to 25 July 2021
- » Fifth instalment of the Malay Heritage Centre's Se-Nusantara series of community co-curated exhibitions and programmes on the ethnic and cultural diversity of the Malay community in Singapore
- Traced the historical journey of the Banjar community, or 'Urang Banjar', and introduced their culture and identity through ethnographic objects, community stories, and treasured family belongings, which showcased their strong sense of kinship, industry, and history.
- Of the over 100 items displayed, more than 30 were loans from the Banjar community.
- Featured a dedicated children's space, My Babak's Studio, which was based on the childhood memories of two sisters whose late father was a Banjarese diamond trader and jeweller.









HOME, TRULY: GROWING UP WITH SINGAPORE, 1950S TO THE PRESENT

- » National Museum of Singapore
- » 19 December 2020 to 3 October 2021
- » Digital companion available
- Explored moments and experiences in Singapore's past and present, to encourage visitors to reflect on what Singapore means to them and their hopes for the home we aspire to be.
- "Home" was presented through the voices of the people. A quarter of the 200 photographs featured were community-contributed, while rich personal stories of living and growing up in Singapore were unearthed through a public call and engagement sessions.
- The exhibition included a pilot experience for visually impaired visitors, involving the use of a prototype smart cane which provided a descriptive audio tour and navigational instructions.
- The exhibition is presented in collaboration with The Straits Times in conjunction with its 175th anniversary.

- Three exhibitions threw the spotlight on the community of people behind the Asian Civilisations Museum (ACM), revealing the human side of the museum through the stories and perspectives of staff, tenants, partners, artists, and collectors.
- Faith Beauty Love Hope Our Stories, Your ACM: a special exhibition of stories from the hearts and minds of staff and supporters of the museum, inspired by the best of ACM's collection.
- Perfect Stranger: an installation by Singaporean artist Dawn Ng, revealing the wonder of human connection.

RIVER HONGBAO 2021 EXHIBITION - GUARDIANS OF

- » Sun Yat Sen Nanyang Memorial Hall
- » In collaboration with the Singapore Federation of Chinese Clan Associations, Mandarin Docents, Anderson Secondary School, Catholic High School, and River Valley High School
- » 10 to 20 February 2021
- \bullet Explored the importance and symbolism of the lion in Chinese culture, highlighted the different styles and components of a lion dance performance, and traced the rich history of Chinese lion dance performances in Singapore.
- 12 student guides from Anderson Secondary School, Catholic High School, and River Valley High School provided video tours of the exhibition, replacing the on-site guided tours of previous editions.









PICTURING THE PANDEMIC: A VISUAL RECORD OF COVID-19 IN SINGAPORE

- » National Museum of Singapore» 27 February to 17 October 2021
- Chronicled Singapore's response to the unprecedented COVID-19 global crisis, through commissioned works by five local photographers and two filmmakers, along with a selection of objects collected from a public open call.
- Marked the National Museum's introductory exhibition of its new *Collecting Contemporary Singapore* initiative, which seeks to document contemporary events and developments in Singapore by collecting related artefacts and stories through engagements with the public.











SIKHS IN SINGAPORE - A STORY UNTOLD

- » Indian Heritage Centre
- » 26 March to 30 September 2021
- Celebrates the rich history and lesser-known stories of the small but prominent Sikh community in Singapore.
- Co-created with the Sikh community, it showcases more than 450 artefacts from local and international private collections, institutional collections of Sikh organisations in Singapore, as well as the National Collection.

SCRIBBLE TOWN

» From 30 September 2020

- Presented with Singapore Children's Society, this interactive children's exhibition aimed to raise awareness of the issue of bullying through the story of three comic-style illustrated characters in the fictional world of "Scribble Town".
- The physical exhibition was hosted at Sun Yat Sen Nanyang Memorial Hall (SYSNMH) till 31 January 2021. A travelling version of the exhibition is on display at different venues in Singapore in 2021.







DORAEMON'S TIME-TRAVELLING ADVENTURES IN SINGAPORE

- » National Museum of Singapore » 31 October to 27 December 2020
- Over 90,000 visitors embarked on a time-travelling adventure with Doraemon, the lovable robot cat and main character of the eponymous Japanese manga series. They explored stories of Singapore through artefacts in the National Collection, and also participated in an exciting on-site scavenger hunt that offered the chance to bring home specially-designed collectibles.
- The campaign was complemented by an online trail, where participants rediscovered fun facts about 14 neighbourhoods around Singapore through an "island-wide" hunt.
- Won the Gold award for the category of Best Public Relations (PR) Campaign: Government/Public Services at the *PR Awards 2021*, which discovers, recognises, and rewards the best in the PR and communications industry across Southeast Asia, South Asia, and the ANZ regions.
- The campaign is also a finalist in the Outstanding Marketing Idea category of the Singapore Tourism Awards 2021 presented by the Singapore Tourism Board.











OVERSEAS EXHIBITIONS

THE BAOLI ERA: TREASURES FROM THE TANG SHIPWRECK COLLECTION

- » Shanghai Museum
- » 15 September 2020 to 10 January 2021
- » Held in conjunction with the 2020 commemoration of 30 years of diplomatic ties between Singapore and the People's Republic of China
- First dedicated exhibition of ACM's Tang Shipwreck Collection in China, which provided fresh perspectives of the history of the shipwreck's 9th-century cargo.
- 248 artefacts including 168 treasures from the ACM's Tang Shipwreck Collection were on display in the Shanghai Museum.










EARLY CHINESE NEWSPAPERS IN SINGAPORE AND THE CHINESE REVOLUTION

- » Sun Yat-sen Library, Zhongshan, China » 12 November to 12 December 2020
- SYSNMH travelled a showcase of over 100 artefacts and historical images to the Sun Yat-sen Library in Zhongshan, which explored the history of Chinese newspapers in Singapore from the early 1880s to 1942, and their links to the revolutionary movement in China.

TRAVELLING EXHIBITIONS

SEEING IS BELIEVING -**EVERY STAMP TELLS A STORY**

- » August 2020 to May 2021
- Seeing is Believing featured stamps made of exotic materials, such as Thai silk for Thai stamps, cork for Portuguese ones, lace for stamps from European countries, and the world's first hand-pasted beaded stamps from Singapore, which paid homage to the exquisite beadwork of the Peranakans.

Did you know that Portugal is the world's biggest producer and exporter of cork? This stamp is made from wafer-thin "paper cork", with a thickness of just 0.35mm.



NEW GALLERY OPENINGS

COMPLETION OF MATERIALS AND DESIGN GALLERIES

- » Asian Civilisations Museum » From 4 April 2020
- ACM unveiled its new third-floor galleries Fashion and Textiles, and Jewellery marking the completion of the museum's multi-year refresh as Singapore's museum of Asian antiquities and decorative art.
- The two new galleries, together with the refreshed Ceramics gallery, are collectively themed Materials and Design, and display over 400 precious and finely-crafted masterpieces, telling stories of Asian identities, histories, and cultures.









NEW GALLERY OPENINGS

REFRESH OF THE GOH SENG CHOO GALLERY: A VOYAGE OF LOVE AND LONGING

- » National Museum of Singapore
- » From 10 February 2021
- The refreshed space brings visitors on a journey through the emotions experienced during a sea voyage across the Malay
- Archipelago, through selections from the William Farquhar Collection of Natural History Drawings featured alongside the social memories, literature, and material culture of the Malay world.
- Complemented with a game app in which players can chart their own sea adventures.









NEW GALLERY OPENINGS

REFRESH OF GALLERY 3

- » Sun Yat Sen Nanyang Memorial Hall
- » From January 2021
- The refreshed Gallery 3 focuses on the social reforms, commemorative events, and identity of the Chinese community after the 1911 Revolution.
- Features updated content and 12 new artefacts, including community contributions such as a commemorative tea set and bowl featuring the "18-Star Flag" and "Five-Coloured Flag", a commemorative badge bearing the image of Dr Sun Yat Sen, and a New Year greeting card with the words "Bo Ai" (universal love)*.

The back of this greeting card depicts the ancient Chinese myth of the goddess Ma Gu offering longevity peaches, while the front of the card features the words "Bo Ai" (universal love), which encapsulated Dr Sun Yat Sen's vision for Chinese democracy. Cards bearing scripted messages were distributed before the Chinese New Year as a way of wishing friends and family a better year ahead.

This commemorative tea set and bowl, which were used by the Chinese in Singapore, are decorated with the "18-Star Flag" and "Five-Coloured Flag". They were produced in Chaozhou to celebrate the first anniversary of the 1911 Revolution.



FOUNDERS' MEMORIAL: A MEMORIAL BUILT BY SINGAPOREANS

- Following the announcement of the winning architectural design by Kengo Kuma & Associates, in collaboration with K2LD Architects in March 2020, NHB continued its public engagement efforts to involve Singaporeans in the development of the memorial
- From August 2020 to March 2021, experience design workshops were conducted with close to 300 participants, with sessions in different languages for youths and seniors, educators and creatives, and persons with disabilities and their caregivers.
- The workshops built on past engagement efforts, where Singaporeans had shared their hopes for the Founders' Memorial to be a welcoming, integrated gallery and garden space for all to enjoy, and an evocative space for reflection. These workshops gathered insights and generated ideas on how this vision could be realised through curating the key moments during a visitor's journey and various spaces at the site.

- The Heritage Conservation Centre (HCC) has been a dedicated repository and conservation facility for the care of Singapore's National Collection since 2000, housing more than 200,000 artefacts and artworks.
- The centre has established itself as a sector leader in heritage conservation over the last 20 years, with a team of experts who manage and provide the best possible care for the National Collection.
- The centre boasts climate-controlled repositories and specialised conservation laboratories for the storage and treatment of different types of artefacts and artworks, and a state-of-the-art conservation science laboratory which conducts scientific analysis, material testing, and research.

- Various public programmes were launched to commemorate HCC's 20th birthday, including:
- Two videos on Facebook "live" that took viewers behind-the-scenes to introduce the facility, the team and how they care for our National Collection.
- Trial programme *Collection Cares*, which involved artworks featuring familiar scenes from old Singapore travelling to homes for seniors, coupled with on-site craft activities conducted by an art therapist over Zoom, to spark memory recall and conversations, and improve their emotional well-being.
- HCC continued to develop its capabilities through collaborations and research projects, and the sharing of this knowledge on local and international platforms. Notable projects included:
- A collaborative project with the Queensland Art Gallery, Gallery of Modern Art, Brisbane, to investigate the materials and properties of contemporary pre-primed canvases has led to poster presentations at the 13th *Infrared and Raman Users Group* symposium in Sydney and the Conserving Canvas Symposium at Yale University.
- A research paper on the use of non-woven support materials for the conservation of three-dimensional painted silk presented at the 48th American Institute for Conservation Annual Meeting's textiles specialty session.

- A presentation on the reflection into the conservation of Peranakan silk costumes for the international conference organised by the Queen Sirikit Museum of Textiles, Thailand, and Thammasat University.
- -A paper on the use of controlled vocabulary in the cataloguing of Singapore's National Collection was presented during the virtual CIDOC (the International Council of Museum's (ICOM) International Committee for Documentation) Conference 2020, and accepted for publication by the Heritage University's online magazine.
- A paper co-written by HCC and the Singapore Art Museum on conserving a contemporary artwork by FX Harsono, which was accepted for publication by South Korea's National Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art.

- Training sessions conducted on textiles and mounting for seamstresses, integrated pest management for museums and heritage institutions, and basic collections care for government institutions.











DIGITAL ACCESSIBILITY

LAYERED HERITAGE EXPERIENCES WITH CHATBOTS

• Content-delivery chatbots were deployed at selected NHB museums and heritage institutions, notably at the National Museum's Home, Truly: Growing Up with Singapore, 1950s to the Present exhibition, offering visitors deeper engagements with audio tours, artefact highlights, exhibition captions in four languages, a digital catalogue, and a digital concierge.

NEW DOCENT AND CURATOR GUIDED TOUR VIDEOS FOR THE INDIAN HERITAGE CENTRE

• The Indian Heritage Centre (IHC) launched new digital tours, led by IHC's curators and docents, which allow digital visitors to embark on self-guided journeys of the galleries at their own time and pace. They involved a total of 29 docents from the Friends of the Museums and Museum Volunteers groups.

STUDENT GUIDED TOUR VIDEO SERIES FOR SYSNMH

- A series of 16 videos (eight in English and eight in Mandarin) introduce the content of SYSNMH's Gallery 4 – Chinese Business Pioneers, featuring 40 students from ITE College West, River Valley High School, and Singapore Chinese Girls' School.
- Part of SYSNMH's inaugural online Student Guide Training Programme, in collaboration with the Friends of the Museums and Mandarin Docents groups.







LAUNCH OF NEW SOCIAL MEDIA PLATFORMS

- ACM launched its WeChat account for online and on-site engagement for Chinese-speaking audiences. Followers can explore ACM's galleries virtually and learn more about the museum's collection through its mini-programmes.
- IHC launched its TikTok account to reach out to younger audiences.











INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATIONS

NHB-ICHCAP MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

» Signed on 25 March 2021

• To enhance bilateral cooperation in ICH matters, NHB and the International Information and Networking Centre for Intangible Cultural Heritage in the Asia-Pacific Region Under the Auspices of UNESCO (ICHCAP) signed a five-year memorandum of understanding (MOU). The MOU covers collaborations on ICH-related initiatives, such as staff exchanges, research, publications, training programmes, and conferences on ICH themes.

LOAN OF BUNGA EMAS (GOLD FLOWER) ROYAL SCULPTURE FROM KEDAH STATE MUSEUM

• A prized royal sculpture known as the Bunga Emas was loaned to Malay Heritage Centre (MHC) from the Kedah State Museum, Malaysia for the Seekor Singa, Seorang Putera dan Sebingkai Cermin (A Lion, A Prince and a Mirror) special exhibition. A 19th century tributary gift from the Sultanate of Kedah to Siam, this object had not left Kedah since 1958 prior to this loan, and was on display at MHC from February to July 2020.

ICOM AUSTRALIA-ICOM SINGAPORE MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

» Signed on 10 November 2020

• To strengthen bilateral cooperation in the museum and heritage sector, NHB and the National Museum of Australia signed a five-year MOU, on behalf of ICOM Singapore and ICOM Australia respectively. The MOU covers collaborations on conservation-related projects, most notably a joint pilot training programme on conservation and collection management for Southeast Asian professionals in 2022.



SHARING THE STORIES AND LANGUAGES OF OUR COMMUNITIES

THE HOUGANG HERITAGE TRAIL - NHB'S 20TH HERITAGE TRAIL

- The *Hougang Heritage Trail* traces the transformation of one of Singapore's oldest heartland towns, from a rural area with vast plantations and fruit orchards to a modern, thriving heartland estate.
- Features 28 new interviews with community members, the highest number of all of NHB's trails to date.
- First trail in the heartlands to feature two National Monuments, which were both gazetted in 2005: the Church of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Hougang Tou Mu Kung.

DID YOU KNOW:

- Hougang is commonly pronounced as Au Kang, its name in both Teochew and Hokkien. It means "at the back of the river", and is a reference to Sungei Serangoon at the end of Upper Serangoon Road, around which many Teochew-speaking inhabitants settled.
- Hougang became the first housing estate in Singapore to have a fast-food restaurant and bowling alley.
- Upper Serangoon Road is one of the oldest roads built in Singapore. By the late 1830s, the road extended all the way from town to the foot of Sungei Serangoon. Many of Hougang's early landmarks are situated along this road and can still be seen here today.

SPEAK GOOD ENGLISH MOVEMENT Let's connect. Let's Speak Good English.

- » Year-long
- Encourages Singaporeans to appreciate the value of good English in connecting and communicating across cultures and borders.
- Presented a series of five lighthearted videos which depicted everyday
 Singaporeans in familiar situations and contexts as they debated the use of certain
- English words. The videos received more than 2 million views on Mediacorp Channel 5 and more than 1 million views on social media.
- 49 partner-led programmes engaged more than 3,110 participants and raised awareness on the importance of using standard English.
- The Inspiring Teacher of English Award 2020, presented with The Straits Times and supported by the Ministry of Education, recognised seven exceptional English teachers.







SPEAK MANDARIN CAMPAIGN

» Year-long

- 32 partner-led programmes encouraged the use and appreciation of Mandarin and engaged more than 4,000 live and digital participants.
- 494 family teams registered for the ninth edition of the *Speak Mandarin Campaign Family Talent Competition*, held virtually with CHIJ St Nicholas Girls' School (Primary), the Committee to Promote Chinese Language Learning, and PCF Sparkletots.
- 61 students participated in the fourth edition of the Speak Mandarin Campaign "My Story" Public Speaking Competition. The grand finals were streamed live to an online audience of more than 48,000.
- The first-ever online dialogue titled Speak Mandarin, Spark Creativity! featured speakers Dr Woo Yen Yen, Wang Shijia (Ang Ku Kueh Girl), Neo Hai Bin, Ben Hum, and Liu Kuan Yin. 215 participants were engaged over Zoom, with 819 viewers actively following via the Facebook live-stream.













SHARING THE STORIES AND LANGUAGES OF OUR COMMUNITIES

BULAN BAHASA (MALAY LANGUAGE MONTH)

Cita. Citra. Cinta. Bahasa Kita. (Relevance, diversity and love for the language)

- » 15 August to 11 October 2020
- The first-ever virtual *Bulan Bahasa* was presented by 62 community groups, Malay Activity Executive Committees, and schools on Zoom, Facebook, and Instagram. 1,610 participants were engaged in programmes over Zoom and garnered 279,700 views for 144 programmes hosted on various social media platforms.
- The launch ceremony was televised on Mediacorp Suria for the first time and reached a total of 73,740 viewers. Three *Duta Bahasa* (Malay Language Ambassadors) were appointed at the ceremony.

RAKAN BAHASA (FRIENDS OF THE LANGUAGE)

- 315 students from 157 schools were appointed as *Rakan Bahasa* to cultivate their love for the Malay language and inspire their friends and families.
- These students were given opportunities to hone their Malay language skills through Kembara Rakan Bahasa activity cards, Penterjemah Pintar (Translation Competition), Oh Hello Skoolz! radio segments, and a public speaking workshop. They were also involved in the televised launch ceremony as presenters and performers.

ANUGERAH GURU ARIF BUDIMAN (MALAY LANGUAGE TEACHERS AWARD)

- Three outstanding teachers were recognised for their contributions to the learning and teaching of the Malay language.
- Co-presented by Majlis Bahasa Melayu Singapura (Malay Language Council, Singapore), Persatuan Guru Bahasa Melayu (Malay Language Teachers Association), Berita Harian, and the Malay Language Learning and Promotion Committee.

TAMIL LANGUAGE FESTIVAL தமிழை நேசிப்போம், தமிழில் பேசுவோம் Love Tamil, Speak Tamil » 28 November to 20 December 2020

- The first-ever virtual *Tamil Language Festival* by the Tamil Language Council involved 25 partners and it encouraged the appreciation and use of Tamil through drama, music, dialogues, competitions, and seminars.
- 1,790 participants were engaged over 25 programmes, with 39,930 views received for 16 programmes which were hosted on various social media platforms.
- Seven capacity building programmes in the form of theatre and acting classes, and writing workshops were conducted to deepen the younger generation's appreciation for Tamil.

CHILDREN'S SEASON 2020

- On-site and online offerings by
 Museum Roundtable museums
 across the island
- » November 2020 to January 2021
- Children's Season aims to inculcate a love for heritage in children through fun and educational programmes and cultivate a museum-going culture.
- 2020's edition saw the creation of a virtual *Hide-N-Seek* game with 22 levels, each themed after a participating museum, which encouraged the virtual exploration of artefacts and museum spaces through panoramic 360° photographs.
- 500 children from social service agencies and student care centres enjoyed craft workshops using a kit co-developed by ACM and partner Red Balloon Therapy, inspired by art therapy principles, to evoke a sense of safety and comfort in participants.
- Children and families at the National Museum explored the topic of change, inspired by stories of resilience and innovation "told" by featured artefacts. Families were guided through this process as they participated in on-site activities such as a *My Family's Stories* kit and and a family mindfulness workshop.



MUSEUM-BASED LEARNING AT NHB MUSEUMS

- » More than 4,000 students participated from November 2020 to March 2021
- Museum-based Learning (MBL) involves all Primary 6 and Secondary 2 students and aims to instil a deeper appreciation of Singapore's history and development, and a sense of pride in the younger generation.
- Part of the Ministry of Education's (MOE) cohort learning journeys.
- Trained museum educators facilitate conversations and conduct storytelling, role-playing, and hands-on activities.
- To sustain engagement when on-site museum visits were temporarily halted, NHB and MOE co-developed MBL teaser videos and e-learning experience packages, which students could access via MOE's Student Learning Space portal.

HERITAGE EXPLORERS PROGRAMME

- » More than 90,000 students from over 100 primary schools have participated since 2016
- Heritage Explorers Programme aims to raise students' awareness and interest in local and community heritage through creative role-playing.
- Complements the primary school curriculum and emphasises school-parent partnerships, and greater parent-child bonding.

DRAW MY STAMP STORY ART COMPETITION

- More than 5,500 primary and secondary school students participated in the annual competition organised by the Singapore Philatelic Museum.
- The competition aims to cultivate students' appreciation in postage stamp designs.

- Promotes Singapore's multicultural heritage through creative classroom activities paired with meaningful learning journeys at our museums.

MONUMENTAL ROBO-TOURS

- Monumental Robo-Tours is a new programme which enables school students to go on guided tours of participating National Monuments remotely with a mobile telepresence robot.
- Increases accessibility to our National Monuments, bringing them closer to students through the use of technology.

SG TIME TRAVELLERS AND ASSEMBLY PROGRAMME

- Thematic experiential guided tours and complementary assembly programmes which focus on national resilience, and aim to foster a sense of national identity in students.
- While on-site trails were suspended in FY2020, NHB conducted programmes during online assemblies for more than 21,000 upper primary, secondary, and tertiary students.

TERTIARY PARTNERSHIPS

- NHB actively engages post-secondary education institutions to integrate heritage content into the existing modules of their curricula, to sustain interest in heritage throughout the schooling journey.
- In FY2020, more than 2,500 first-year Singapore Management University students participated in specially co-created heritage experiences at NHB museums as part of one of their core modules.

ARTS AND CULTURE RESILIENCE PACKAGE (ACRP) GRANTS

- To support the digitalisation and continued operation of heritage organisations during COVID-19, NHB administered three grants in FY2020: the Digital Project Grant (DPG), Capability Development Scheme for the Arts (CDSA), and the ACRP Operating Grant.
- A total of approximately \$225,000 has been awarded to 15 *DPG* and *CDSA* projects by heritage organisations and private museums to date.

- Our family of volunteers includes docents from the Friends of the Museums, Japanese Docents, Mandarin Docents, Mandarin Guides, and Museum Volunteers, as well as volunteers from Museum Hosts, Preservation of Sites and Monuments Volunteer Guides, and HCC Volunteer Guides.
- Other passionate individuals who volunteer at NHB events, programmes, and festivals include *HeritageCares'* volunteers who serve as guides, befrienders, and facilitators, and Care Facilitators at the National Museum.
- Presented annually since 2015, NHB's Heritage Volunteers Appreciation and Awards recognised 103 long-serving docents including Ms Pauline Choe, who was presented with the 20-year Long Service Award.

MUSEUM ROUNDTABLE HONGBAO CAMPAIGN

» 22 January to 19 February 2021

 Returning for its 7th edition, the campaign featured 32 specially-designed ox-themed red packets customised to represent participating Museum Roundtable (MR) members, and a special QR Code scavenger hunt.

BATTLE FOR SINGAPORE 2021

» 20 February to 14 March 2021

- Battle for Singapore 2021 commemorated the 79th anniversary of the Fall of Singapore with a series of programmes that featured various places and stories related to the Japanese Occupation, in partnership with MR museums, local heritage experts, and heritage groups.
- These included 37 guided tours, such as special-access tours of Fort Siloso and mini-museum tours at the Former Ford Factory, National Gallery Singapore, Singapore Discovery Centre, and Eurasian Heritage Gallery.

MUSEUM ROUNDTABLE CAPABILITY DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES

- NHB conducted eight webinars on topics from digitalisation to COVID-19 recovery plans as part of the sharing of best practices among MR members.
- 'MRadio a podcast series recorded and produced by NHB – was launched to provide MR members and museum enthusiasts on-the-go access to conversations and observations on the museum landscape in Singapore. Three episodes about museum education, curation, and the background of the MR have since been broadcast.

PATRON OF HERITAGE AWARDS 2020



 HeritageCares also worked closely with Youth Corps Singapore to conceptualise a virtual theatre-based programme, Let's be STARS, which incorporated heritage content and elements of drama play, and jointly brought meaning to Heritage Thursdays together under KidsFun. The facilitation of these programmes were assisted by over 500 youth volunteers.

SILVER HUBS

- The Silver Hubs initiative co-develops agefriendly programmes with partners from the health and social care sectors to provide enriching heritage experiences for seniors and promote active ageing.
- In FY2020, Silver Hubs launched the My House of Memories app, developed in collaboration with National Museums Liverpool and the British Council Singapore. The app features a digital library of familiar objects to trigger memories for persons living with dementia, to encourage greater interaction with their caregivers. These include 100 objects from Singapore's National Collection and 11 additional objects from the Alzheimer's Disease Association. The app also serves as a resource that provides localised content, such as information on dementia in Singapore, suggestions on activities for seniors and caregivers to engage in, and contacts for them to reach out to.
- Silver Hubs also continued to engage the silver community through digital programmes such as Virtual Return to the Tea Dance, in which seniors participated virtually in evergreen music and dance sessions that promoted their psycho-social and emotional well-being.



DIGITAL ACCESSIBILITY

THE ALL NEW ROOTS.GOV.SG – NHB'S ONE-STOP DIGITAL CONCIERGE

- NHB relaunched its heritage portal, *Roots*. *gov.sg*, as a one-stop digital concierge with a cultural ontology that brings together digital resources from across Singapore's arts and culture scene.
- The portal is currently home to over 100,000 artefacts and multimedia resources, spanning our National Collection, heritage trails, National Monuments, historic sites, intangible cultural heritage, and more.

- Highlights of the revamped Roots.gov.sg include:
- More advanced artificial intelligence which powers more accurate and relevant searches and recommendations, allowing users to find information from the extensive catalogue easily, and suggested exploratory routes based on individual users' areas of interest.
- Cultural ontology integrates resources from partners' databases, including the National Library Board's Infopedia and the Esplanade - Theatres on the Bay's Offstage, enabling the discovery of a wider selection of content.
- A brand-new look, improved user-friendliness, fresh content, and enhanced features, such as a more seamless integration with Google Maps for navigation around heritage trails and National Monuments.

GROUP OF HEIRLOOM JEWELLERY

Philippines
Late 19th to 20th century
Gift of the Montilla Family of Pulupandan, Negros Occidental
and gift of the estate of Doña Leoncia Lacson y Torres of
Talisay, Negros Occidental

These adornments were inherited through four generations of the Montilla family, who are Spanish-mestizos from Negros Island and pioneers of large-scale sugar production in the Philippines. These objects reflect the family's mixed ancestry and reference pivotal moments in history, such as the spread of the Catholic faith due to the Spanish colonisation of the Philippines and the historical role of the Philippines as a global producer of tortoiseshell products, gold, pearls, and coral. Manila, being an important jewellery-making centre, attracted itinerant smiths from places like Fujian, China, who contributed to the creation of hybrid and cross-cultural jewellery.



COLLECTION OF 12 WATERCOLOUR PAINTINGS BY ARTISTS ONG KIM SENG AND CHEW PIAK SAN

Late 1970s and 1980s Gift of 3M Singapore

3M Singapore donated 12 watercolour paintings – eight by Ong Kim Seng and four by Chew Piak San – to the Singapore Philatelic Museum. Works by the artists show old street scenes of Singapore during the late 1970s and 1980s.



SCROLL CASE FITTED WITH ESTHER SCROLL

Probably Canton, China Mid to late 19th century Gilded silver, ink on parchment

Decorated with alternating panels of bamboo and prunus chased in low relief and enamelled in blue and green, this gilded silver case was made to house a scroll of the Hebrew Book of Esther. The Book of Esther, often referred to as the "Megillah", is read out loud in the synagogue during the Jewish feast of Purim, which is celebrated on the 14th of Adar (February or March).

This case was made in Guangzhou (Canton) or Hong Kong, as evidenced by the marks on its base. It was in the collection of the Sassoons, a family of Baghdadi–Jewish descent who moved to Mumbai (Bombay), India, and acquired immense wealth in the China trade.




MUSLIM DIVORCE CERTIFICATE ISSUED DURING THE JAPANESE OCCUPATION

944

This certificate was administered by a kadi, an appointed Muslim official who usually oversees marriage solemnisations, for the granting of a divorce between a couple living in Geylang during the Japanese Occupation. Issued by the Syonan

Tokubetsu-shi or municipal arm of the Japanese administration on 24 December 2604 (the Japanese imperial year, which corresponds with 1944 CE in the Gregorian calendar), the certificate specifies several important details about the divorce, including the names of the couple, the witnesses to and location of the divorce proceedings, the nature of the divorce, as well as evidence of alimony.



TRADITIONAL BANJARESE WEDDING TEXTILE

Late 20th century

This wedding backdrop is made of sequins and consists of a main panel (dinding tengah) as well as two fringe panels (tabiran). It is known as kain arguci (also spelt as air guci), with 'arguci' being a reference to the style of embroidery where sequins are embroidered to create large-scale decorative motifs on a piece of silk or satin.

Arguci is thought to have originated from the Banjar community in South Kalimantan, Indonesia, in the 18th century and its use extended to the Banjar community in Singapore, whose members have recalled purchasing or renting them from merchants in Singapore and South Kalimantan.

AUTOGRAPH BOOKS BELONGING TO PIONEERING BATCH OF MALAY WOMEN TEACHING GRADUATES

1950 – 1953

This pair of autograph books belonged to a former Malay teacher and alumnus of the Maktab Perguruan Perempuan Melayu, or Malay Women's Training College (MWTC) that was established in Malacca in 1934. The MWTC was one of the few training colleges for aspiring women Malay teachers, including from Singapore. The autograph book documents the owner's move from her days as a student at the MWTC to her new residence in Geylang, Singapore, as well as the hopes and aspirations of an emergent class of newly formally-educated Malay women in post-independence Singapore and Malaysia.









PAIR OF DEER

Tibet, 18th century Gilded copper

This pair of standing deer, one female and the other male with a single horn, were made in copper alloy repoussé and gilded. Deer sculptures like these would flank an eight-spoked *Dharmachakra* (wheel of Dharma) symbolising the teachings of the Buddha. In monasteries and temples in Tibet, Mongolia, Bhutan, and elsewhere in the Himalayas, such an ensemble is installed at the highest point of its roof or on major gateways, the most famous example being the one on the Jokhang temple in Lhasa, Tibet.

PORTRAIT PLAQUE, RING AND BOX BELONGING TO DR LIM BOON KENG

Germany, England, and Singapore Early 20th century Various materials Gift of Lim Kok Lian in memory of his grandparents Lim Boon Keng and Grace Pek Ha Yin

The gold ring is engraved with the couple's initials and the date of their 1908 wedding. The German porcelain plaque featuring their enamel painted portrait was likely a wedding gift. The English sterling silver box was presented to Dr Lim Boon Keng in 1926 by notable friends such as Lim Nee Soon, Song Ong Siang, and Tan Kah Kee, and its inscription makes reference to his position as President of Amoy University. One of the leading Peranakan activists in the early 20th century, Dr Lim was an advocate for educational and political reforms in both the Straits Settlements and China.



SLEEVELESS CHEONGSAM WITH EMBROIDERY OF YELLOW FLOWERS BELONGING TO MRS BENJAMIN SHEARES

1960s – 1970s Gift of Dr Joseph Sheares, Mr Edwin Sheares, and Ms Constance Sheares


This *cheongsam* belonged to Mrs Benjamin Sheares, the wife of Singapore's second President, Mr Benjamin Sheares. Mrs Sheares was born Yeo Seh Geok (1917-2014) in Quanzhou, a small town near Xiamen in the southern Fuijan province of China. She came to Singapore in the late 1930s to escape the Japanese invasion of China. Soon after, she started training as a midwife at the Kandana Kerbau Hospital. In 1939, she married Dr Benjamin Sheares, an established surgeon who later became the president of Singapore from 1971 to 1981. The daisy prints on the *cheongsam* reflect a motif adopted from 'hippie' fashion of the 1960s. Mrs Sheares wore this cheongsam when receiving diplomatic guests in the Istana.



TWO-DAY MARINE CHRONOMETER BELONGING TO HMS BULAN

c1918 – 1919 Wood, metal

This chronometer belonged to the HMS Bulan, a cable laying ship built in 1924 for the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company (P&O). In 1939, at the beginning of World War II, the Bulan was incorporated into the Malayan Auxiliary Fleet. The Japanese invasion of Malaya in December 1941 led to the Bulan being taken over by the Royal Navy, and its crew was replaced by men from the sunken battleships Prince of Wales and Repulse. As Singapore was further threatened by invasion, the evacuation of civilians and some key technicians began in January 1942. The Bulan participated in the evacuation in February 1942, safely bringing refugees from Keppel Harbour to Batavia despite being bombed in the Banka Strait.



WILLIAM HEATHER'S CHART OF THE STRAITS OF MALACCA AND SINGAPORE

1803 Engraved by J. Stephenson Engraving on paper

This extremely rare chart by the London publisher and mapmaker William Heather shows us the navigational understanding of the Straits of Malacca and Singapore at the turn of the 19th century, more than 15 years before the founding of the settlement at Singapore. Of particular interest is the inset map of the Straits of Singapore (spelled as was common at that period as "Sincapore") showing mainland Singapore (identified as Pulo Panjang or "Long Island" in Malay). Tanah Merah is identified on the island's east coast as well, with the labels "Red Cliffs".



TOH KEE ROASTING OVEN

Metal Gift of Toh Kee

This oven is a custom built, brick-lined oven which belonged to to Toh Kee Roast Duck, a food stall at People's Park Food Centre owned by Ms Ng Foong Teng. The stall was founded by her grandfather, Mr Ng Chow Hon, who was born in Panyu, Guangzhou, and moved to Singapore in the early 1900s to earn a living. This oven had been in operation since at least the 1960s. It is a charcoal roaster that can fit twelve ducks at a time.





BLOCK 8 JALAN BUKIT HO SWEE

2017 Darren Soh Archival pigment print Edition 10/10

This photograph of a housing block at Jalan Bukit Ho Swee is part of a series on public housing in Singapore taken by photographer Darren Soh. Jalan Bukit Ho Swee was the site of Singapore's first large-scale construction project carried out by the Housing and Development Board. The estate's two- and three-room flats, built in 1962, were the first flats to undergo Singapore's first-ever public housing upgrading programme – the Main Upgrading Programme – from 1994 to 1995.







AMEK GAMBAR – TAKING PICTURES: PERANAKANS AND PHOTOGRAPHY

Amek Gambar charts the early history of photography in Singapore, from European travellers to pioneering Chinese and Japanese studios in the region. Informative essays and more than 280 photographs from the 1840s to 2009 make this book a fascinating and valuable historical resource. By 1841, just two years after its invention, photography had arrived in Singapore and Peranakans were quick to exploit its potential. This book reveals the diverse ways the community used this medium to express identity, tradition, locality, modernity, nationality, and art.

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF SINGAPORE RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP 2020

The National Museum of Singapore invites researchers to contribute to academic scholarship on Singapore history and heritage. The Fellowship is open to Masters and PhD candidates, and PhD degree holders of all disciplines to conduct independent research on topics related to the National Museum's collections.

Grace Teo examines the National Museum's collection
of colonial-era legal documents. Her project, titled
Certifying Conduct, Character, and Competency:
Advocate-Solicitors as "Qualified Persons" in the
Straits Settlements, examines the role and status of
the advocate-solicitor (lawyer) in colonial Malaya.
This study, as the proposal suggests, is an essential
contribution to the origins of legal practice and
education in colonial administration, and how the law
was administered across the British empire.
