Princely Treasures from the House of Liechtenstein

Collected over 500 years, over 90 masterpieces from the exquisite art collection of the Prince of Liechtenstein are now showcased in Singapore. This exhibition is exemplary of the Princely Family's highly cultivated choice in art, with artworks ranging from paintings, prints and engravings, tapestries, sculptures to rare decorative art objects. Significant works by Flemish artists like Rubens and Anthony van Dyck, as well as those by other renowned European masters such as Raphael and Lukas Cranach the Elder, will be showcased to celebrate the High Renaissance, Baroque, Neoclassical and Biedermeier art styles that span from the late 15th century to the mid-19th century, all of which characterise the European way of articulating authority, power and wealth of the ruling houses.

In addition, a selection of 16 oil paintings from the National Collection will be displayed to draw links to the art of portraiture in Singapore's historical context, exploring how it was an important representational mode between the late 19th and mid-20th century.



Admission charges apply For thousands of years, the cultures of Asia have traded, interacted, and exchanged ideas. This exhibition focuses on the artistic results of these contacts. The objects show how religions moved from region to region, how special objects were eagerly sought in lands far away, and how new works of art were created by the blending of different traditions.

In many cases, objects were produced for trade and export. Other examples document the desire for beauty. The sheer joy and fascination with the exotic can also be witnessed in cross-cultural art. In many different ways, the encounters between cultures have shaped our world, and they affect the way objects look. Global networks of trade and communication were already active in Asia more than two thousand years ago. This exhibition draws from that long history, and provides the public an opportunity to see many of these new and diverse acquisitions for the first time.

Speaker: Professor Clara Bargellini, National Autonomous University of Mexico

Objects from Asia could be found at the Jesuit and Franciscan missions in Mexico and parts of the United States in the period when Spain controlled the region. In this lecture, Clara Bargellini will explain the importance of New Spain in the network of trade and exchange controlled by the Spanish Empire, especially the role of missionaries. What is the history of art at the missions, and what types of objects were present there? Do any remain? Bargellini will discuss the art objects that came from Asia to New Spain, and examine the broader significance of Asia for mission history.

Is the notion of pan-Asian art history a legitimate historical construction? Ever since Okakura Kakuzō used the phrase "Asia is one" in 1903, scholars and curators have struggled with conceptualizing the continent as a whole in the period before 1900. This symposium, held in conjunction with the special exhibition *Devotion and Desire: Cross-Cultural Art in Asia*, considers some of the impulses that might tie together the art histories of a vast continent that embraces many cultures, religions, and languages.

A group of international speakers consider issues such as the overlapping colonial networks and the development of new fused art forms. Attention is given to the tensions between centre and periphery, the supposedly pure and hybrid, nationalism and imperialism, ethnic and colonial. The word "Asia" may be Western in origin, but museums both East and West have attempted to establish pan-Asian collections. The 10th anniversary of the Asian Civilisations Museum in Singapore, a museum dedicated to pan-Asian art, provides an opportunity to examine the concept of Asian art before the twentieth century.

The earliest medicines were derived from compounds of plants and animal parts. In spite of the advances of modern biomedicine, many communities around the world continue to rely on the traditional medical practices of their respective cultures. In fact, many herbal remedies have been lauded for their perceived "holistic" healing benefits, accessibility and affordability.

Ilham Alam: Nature and Healing in the Malay World examines the ways in which various historical Malay communities have harnessed the bounty of flora and

fauna to create both preventive and curative medicines. It also explores the corpus of traditional Malay medicine as a specialised form of local knowledge specially in relation to early Malay conceptualisations of the human body as well as human relationships to the natural environment.

In partnership with the Singapore Botanic Gardens and NParks, the exhibition will also feature a medicinal plant maze, rare 19th century Malay medicinal manuscripts as well as selected tools of trade of traditional Malay healers.

With the evolution of our historical districts, and the presence of market forces that influence what happens within them, are we slowly losing our memories of these spaces? And what can we do to revive them? Listen to the developments from the ground as the speaker discusses the challenges that planners and residents face with changing neighbourhoods such as Chinatown, Little India and Kampong Glam.

The Singapore Botanic Gardens—A Colonial Legacy Speaker: Dr Nigel Taylor, Director, Singapore Botanic Gardens, National Parks Board

This talk will focus on the history of the Singapore Botanic Gardens (SBG) as a colonial garden, its heritage in the economies of Southeast Asia, its social history for Singapore and SBG's outstanding universal values as a candidate UNESCO World Heritage Site. SBG, in many ways, parallels the development of Singapore itself over the past 150 years, beginning as a 'pleasure garden', thereafter assuming the role of a typical British colonial garden for testing and developing new economic crops, before being chosen by former Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew as the place to launch a public programme for racial harmony and cultural development.

Visible Imprints, Invisible Routes: Making Connections with 19th Century Photographs of Singapore

Speaker: Daniel Tham, Curator, National Museum of Singapore

Historical photographs make visible to us sites or sights that once existed, serving as a valuable resource for mapping the historical landscape of a place and identifying the people who passed through or lived there. Beneath these localised questions (Where was this photograph taken? Who is being depicted?) lie broader regional and global concerns (Where did the subject or photographer come from? What brought them here?). Such invisible routes run through 19th century photographs of Singapore. A bustling port city by the second half of the 19th century, Singapore was an important node in the international movement of not just economic products but personalities—travellers, explorers, officials and photographers—whose images each tell a story that connects Singapore to its neighbours and the wider world.

Luminous Depths A Contemporary Project on the Museum Lee Mingwei



The phrase "terms & conditions" often refers to the fixed set of guidelines at the basis of any official contract or agreement. While these extensive specifications are sometimes overlooked in everyday practice, their implementation can powerfully dictate the representation and interaction between people, entities and countries, as well as set parameters that appear rigid over time. Yet, taken apart, the words "terms" and "conditions" convey fluid and precarious concepts that can, in actuality, be continually negotiated and modified.

Many artists with roots in the Arab world work simultaneously across different geographic, physical and cultural contexts, making it difficult to define and constrain them to specific identities and representations. Their work is thus a result of a variety of techniques, which enables them to navigate and speak within multiple contexts.

Terms & Conditions presents an open-ended debate into how history and social realities are represented, with an emphasis

on the Arab world. One of the first Southeast Asian surveys of contemporary art from this dynamic region, the exhibition showcases works by artists with roots in the Arab world. These artists work across different geographic and cultural contexts, and through a combination of techniques, to produce unique artworks that fluidly traverse and defy social identities and representations.

Co-organised by the Singapore Art Museum and Barjeel Art Foundation, and guest curated by Mandy Merzaban, Curator and Collections Manager of the Barjeel Art Foundation, Terms & Conditions draws upon seminal works from Barjeel Art Foundation, the Abraaj Group Art Prize Collection, Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art, Musée national de l'histoire et des cultures de l'immigration, CNHI Paris, as well as the collections of private individuals and artists.





This exhibition, titled *In/sight*: Abstract Art by Wu Guanzhong and Artists from Southeast Asia, presents a selection of abstract works from the national collection to illustrate the diverse motivations for abstraction amidst distinct and varied backgrounds.

Wu Guanzhong (1919-2010), one of the foremost painters in Chinese modern art, was a leading exponent of abstraction in China. matter and physical resemblance to an object in reality.
